

# **ROB THE RAINMAN**

October's total was 89.3mm and this was... just about average and, after September, we'll settle for that. The rain was spread pretty much throughout the month with three dry spells of only 3 to 4 days each time. The 5th to the 20th saw the majority of the rain with 70.5mm. When it wasn't a wet day there was still a lot of dull, grey weather about although there were sporadic periods and even days of lovely October sunshine. Overall it was mild but there was a slight overnight frost on the 11th

and there was also the first named storm of the season – Ashley. But this was a very northern affair and just gave us a breezy day with a bit of rain.

The wet started in October last year and so let's look at the year from then up to this September. Normally we would expect about 730mm (29 inches) of rain during this period but we had 50% more than that with 1116mm (44 inches) with eight months exceeding their average rainfall by 20% or more — in fact a lot more in six of those months. Even in the dryer months, in particular June and August were quite dry, there were a lot of the dull, grey lowering skies about so that it never seemed "dry". So a difficult year of weather; hoping for better, I wish you a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.

**NOVEMBER MEETING ATTENDED BY** Cllr M.Pettit ( Chair), Cllr C. Yates, Cllr N.Smith .T.Griffiths ( Lengthsman) **APOLOGIES** – Cllr A-M Johnson and Cllr J. Whatley

**HIGHLIGHTS** from the Parish Council Meeting held on the 5th November 2024:

- **1 Aston Ingham Parish Council Vacancies** Our search for a Councillor is now into its sixth month. We'd love to hear from anyone who might be seeking more information about the role in this Council which aims to develop and improve existing facilities in the Parish. We certainly can't be as effective without a full complement of volunteers.**2 Clerk Resignation**: Sadly our Clerk Emma Donovan is leaving in December. We will be supported by our Hereford Branch of Local Councils (HALC) in recruiting Emma's replacement.
- 2 It's Budget Time! In preparation for our draft budget 2025/26 we have identified some key projects which we aim to complete next financial year. Our budget sub-committee meets at the end of November to finalise the draft which should be available for consultation in December.
- **3 Lengthsman linked updates**. Terry Griffiths and his Team have completed their first maintenance visit to the Parish, listing jobs by C-road numbers Our immediate task is to communicate to the parish, locations by road name.

Cllr Whatley will be liaising with Terry regularly as we go forward.

- Drainage Grant: Terry reports Parish Councils are beginning to receive their Grants so we expect to hear shortly. Public Right Of Way Grant Application is completed. Terry is meeting with our Footpaths Officer Richard Potter for additional clarification.
- **4 Aston Ingham bespoke Flood Alerts** Our Flood Group will shortly be offering local Flood Alerts to parishioners who wish to sign up. The Alerts are linked to our range of sensors placed around the Parish which monitor volume of water runoff from the surrounding hills.
- **5 Road resurfacing** By the time you read this bulletin the C road from Aston Crews to Lea will have been resurfaced. This is part of an £8 million planned expenditure across the county by Herefordshire Council.

**COMMUNITY ACTION – SPEEDWATCH-** excellent monitoring of traffic continues. See Speedwatch entry.

# **RECTOR'S LETTER**



Happy Christmas!

At Christmas time we celebrate the birth of Christ our King but what is his kingdom like? We have had lots of elections recently, imagine if the candidates are debating on television. Each needs to persuade the voters that theirs is the only way ahead. One talks of more police on the streets and stricter controls at borders. He paints a picture of a country under siege, needing to protect its people. His rival speaks of new

technologies transforming healthcare, of the growth of the economy. She paints a picture of a country that is open and optimistic. You would think they lived in different places. They do not seem even to be speaking the same language.

Jesus and Pontius Pilate do not speak the same language. Pilate is a Latin-speaking Roman. Jesus' language is Aramaic. No doubt Pilate has translators, and in any case will have picked up some Aramaic in his years as Governor of Judea. But the literal language barrier is not the problem when Jesus is brought before Pilate after his arrest. The two of them live in different worlds. Pilate is a citizen of the empire of Rome. Jesus is a citizen of the kingdom of heaven.

"My kingdom is not from this world," says Jesus. It is not about running a country or indeed an empire. It is not about structures and politics. It is not about absolute rule, however benevolent. Rather, it is a vision of what might be, a hope for something beyond the realities of the human exercise of power and control. It is about what can happen if it is God who is truly Israel's king.

We are in a slightly better position than Pilate to understand Jesus' kingship, because we know what Jesus said about the kingdom. We know that the kingdom is a place where those who are lost and alone are searched out and found, however long it takes. Where the smallest and humblest are just as important as those who are rich and confident. Where those who have done wrong are welcomed with open arms. Where judgement is replaced by forgiveness, and hatred met with love. Where no one needs to hide, because all are welcome just as they are. There is no power-hungry despot in charge, but a king who is willing to die for his people.

Christ invites us to live in this kingdom now, by adopting its values and praying for it to be a reality on earth as in heaven. We are invited to trust that one day we will fully enter the kingdom, and meet the king. When we do, will he be seated in glory on a throne? Or will he, perhaps, be kneeling before us, ready to wash our feet?







#### **Parish Clerk:**

Lea Parish Council was pleased to welcome Neil Barrington as Clerk/ Responsible Financial Officer at the meeting held on 30th October. Neil is fully qualified and it is anticipated that he will prove to be a real asset.

#### **Financial Matters:**

During October the Lea Parish Council accounts with Lloyds Bank were closed and from now on all banking will be with Unity Trust Bank. 

# IN THE FRAME

# Giving art a fresh look

The modest little shed with its curved roof set back from Stoney Road in the middle of acres of orchard farmland is highly deceptive. Inside is a sophisticated climate-controlled workshop where Kelly Robinson, known as 'Kel' to everyone around, demonstrates her skills in picture framing.

After a career in the hotel business, Kel moved with her husband to Rose Cottage in 2012 and encouraged by her brother took over a framing business based in Woolhope some nine years ago when a family member retired.

She relocated it to Kilcot, but the shed was cold and damp and the roof was collapsing — hardly the best



place for sensitive prints and paintings or ornate woodwork. With hard work from her family and local craftsmen she restored the building, built benches and stands to prepare the frames on, installed proper air conditioning and heating, good lighting and mainly by word of mouth — and of course by regular advertising in *The Chimes* — built up a highly successful framing enterprise in the succeeding years.

Now, local artists, collectors and businesses as well as numerous residents, call on her services, either to frame newly acquired works or to reframe existing paintings which have not been done well. And it is not just traditional works of art that are framed: people ask for magazine covers, special cards, family photographs, jewellery and necklaces to be displayed in such a way that they can be eventually unmounted if required at a later date. This means very careful use of fixatives and sealants — it is not just a question of 'glueing and banging.'

Framing also involves a variety of techniques, from woodworking to paper and glass-cutting. Kel has benefited from established artistic ventures in the area such as **h-Art**, the Herefordshire-based annual art festival and exhibition

which causes local artists to have greater opportunity to exhibit their work and therefore need framers more. So there are a lot of repeat customers but also newcomers who may not know what they are looking for. "There is a great deal more to correct choice of frame and mount than many people realise at first," says Kel. "They come in thinking its a simple choice and then after half an hour realise that it can make a huge difference. But just like the art itself, everyone's ideas differ and I try to give them a choice of styles and sizes I think will work."

Talking of "huge" — Kel's current work includes a 2 metre by 2.4 metre canvas rolled up next to her workbench, which will only just accommodate it. "I need some extra muscle power for a job like this," she jokes. In fact, she also plays cricket for Aston Ingham Ladies and that keeps her fairly fit.

Her weirdest framing job? Mounting a World War II anti-Nazi toilet roll with



pictures of Hitler on it! And championship framing а boxing belt for a client in America. But, she insists, she doesn't do football shirts. "It's too timeconsuming for me and too expensive for the customer. There are specialists to do that. Anyway, I already have four-week waiting list. Good framing is not an overnight job."

Looking at the excellent work she does, it's not surprising.





### LINTON PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

(Covering Bromsash, Gorsley and Linton)

The Parish Council has welcomed Chris Creswell as a new Councillor. There is one Councillor vacancy remaining, and if you are interested in joining please contact the Parish Council Clerk, Rich Hunt, via e-mail: <a href="mailto:pcclerk@lintonpc-herefordshire.gov.uk">pcclerk@lintonpc-herefordshire.gov.uk</a> or telephone: 07763 793695.

Progress is being made on addressing the danger to life posed by the speed of traffic passing through Gorsley on the B4221. Parish Council and community representatives met Herefordshire Council (HCC) and Balfour Beatty (BBLP) officers on 29 October to present the case for a reduction in speed limits and other actions, including clearer road markings, better signage and safety barriers.

HCC are facing serious financial constraints, but the recruitment of additional traffic management officers has improved the processing of traffic regulation orders (TRO) which address the speed limits for traffic on specific roads. The backlog is diminishing and at the current rate of processing, it is estimated that the request for a TRO on the B4221 in Gorsley will be processed in six months. This does not guarantee a reduction in speed, but the case for Gorsley is strong.

The Parish Council and Geardown For Gorsley will produce a plan with objectives that will include a table of options approved by HCC and BBLP. This can inform Parish Council funding decisions and efforts to enlist external financial support from organisations with community response budgets.

The Parish Council has installed a Speed Indication Device (SID) at the east end of Gorsley to monitor and record speeds, and several "Unsuitable for Heavy Goods Vehicles" signs to deter such vehicles from using lanes off the B4221.

All the plots on the Gorsley Allotments are now taken.


